I.

Plaintiff State of New California is an incorporated IRC 501(c)(4) educational association in the process of creating a new state within the existing border of California using the United States Constitution, Article IV, Section 3. Paul Preston is a citizen elector residing in Sutter County and President of State of New California and John Does 1-10, members of the State of New California and citizens of the State of California.

II.

Gavin Newsom is a California resident and Governor of the State of California. Alex Padilla at all times mentioned herein was a California resident and the Secretary of State of California. Shirley Weber is currently the Secretary of State of California. Does #1-100 are yet to be determined, and will be added when their identities and capacities are determined.

1 **Count 1:**

2 III

3 California Election Code §13200 (2019) states, “Ballots not printed in accordance
4 with this chapter shall not be cast nor counted at any election. (Enacted by Stats. 1994, Ch.
5 920, Sec. 2.)” Those required statutory ballot statements are, “(Elections Code) §13205 (b).
6 In elections when electors of President and Vice President of the United States are to be
7 chosen, there shall be placed upon the ballot, in addition to the instructions to voters as
8 provided in this chapter, an instruction as follows:

9 “To vote for all of the electors of a party, mark the voting target next to
10 the names of the presidential and vice presidential candidates of that
11 party. A mark of the voting target next to the name of a party and its
12 presidential and vice presidential candidate, is a vote for all of the
13 electors of that party, but for no other candidates.”

12 IV.

13 In California in the November, 2020 election, the above-mandated language did not
14 appear in ballots distributed in fifty-three (53) of California’s 58 counties.¹

15 V.

16 In the remaining five (5) California Counties², the mandatory language of Election

AND OTHER RELIEF

1 Code §13205(b), apparently did appear on the face of the purported ballot, but the following
2 mandatory language of Election Code §13205(c) was required, but did not appear:

3 “(c) If a group of candidates for electors has been nominated under Chapter 3
4 (commencing with Section 8400) of Division 8, and has under Chapter 1 (commencing at
5 Section 8300) of Division 8 designated the names of the candidates for President and Vice
6 President of the United States for whom those candidates have pledged themselves to vote,
7 the instructions to voters shall also contain the following:

8 “To vote for those electors who have pledged themselves to vote for a
9 candidate for President and Vice President not supported by any particular
10 party stamp a cross (+) in the square opposite the names of those
11 presidential and vice presidential candidates.”

12 VI.

13 Since none of the ballots in any of the 58 counties of California comply with the
14 mandatory ballot printing requirements, pursuant to specific statute, they cannot be voted nor
15 counted for any purpose. The Court should order all the alleged “votes” from these defective
16 ballots be totally disregarded for all purposes except as exhibits in this matter.

17 **Count 2:**

18 VII

19 Paragraphs I-VI are re-alleged as though fully set forth herein.

20 VIII.

21 Pursuant to the putative “votes” cast by these statutorily defective citizen ballots,
22 certain “Presidential Electors” were selected to vote at the national Electoral College.

23 IX.

24 Since the putative “Presidential Electors” were elected pursuant to citizen ballots that,
25 in the terms of California Elections Code § 13200, can not “be cast nor counted at any
26 election,” the “Presidential Electors” alleged election is void for all purposes and should be
27 decertified. Any Electoral College “vote” they have allegedly cast should be ruled “void” for
28 all purposes.

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AND OTHER RELIEF

1 **Count 3:**

2 X.

3 Paragraphs I-IX are re-alleged as though fully set forth herein.

4 XI.

5 In *James Gallagher and Kevin Kiley v Gavin Newsom*, CVCS20-0912 the Sutter
6 County Superior Court ruled that certain actions taken by Governor Newsom pursuant to
7 named Executive Orders N-67-20 were unconstitutional.

8 One of the orders made as part of the unconstitutional Executive Order N 67-20 was
9 the ordering and procurement of the defective, non-statutory compliant ballots. Since the
10 ordering of the ballots and the procurement of the ballots were not Constitutionally
11 authorized, the ballots should not be considered for any purpose except as exhibits in this
12 lawsuit.

13 **Count 4:**

14 XII.

15 Paragraphs I-XI are re-alleged as though fully set forth herein.

16 XIII.

17 The United States Constitution, Article II, Section 1, Clause 2 provides in pertinent
18 part,

19 “Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a
20 Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to
21 which the State may be entitled in the Congress; . . .”

22 XIV.

23 The omission of the statutorily-mandated language required by the California
24 Legislature and the United States Constitution, Article II, Section 1, Clause 2, renders all
25 individual citizen’s ballots cast by voters in the November, 2020 election a nullity. As a
26 result, there were no validly-cast ballots for Presidential Electors.

27 XV.

28 Since there were no ballots cast by voters in California in the November, 2020
Presidential Election that validly elected Presidential Electors, none of the 55 Electoral
College ballots cast on December 14, 2020 is valid, and all must be stricken and decertified.

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AND OTHER RELIEF

1 **Count 5:**

2 XVI.

3 Defendant Gavin Newsom ordered statutorily defective ballots while purportedly
4 acting as the Governor of California.

5 XVII.

6 Defendant Gavin Newsom ordered statutorily defective ballots while purportedly
7 acting as the Governor of California, but his actions were beyond his statutory authority, and
8 therefore actually acting as a private citizen and without statutory authorization.

9 **Count 6:**

10 XVIII.

11 Defendant Gavin Newsom changed by Executive Order N-67-20 the time and manner
12 of casting individual citizen ballots, the exclusive province of the California Legislature. His
13 actions were without statutory authorization and illegal.

14 **Count 7:**

15 XIX.

16 Defendant Gavin Newsom changed by Executive Order N-67-20 the time and manner
17 of casting individual citizen ballots, the exclusive province of the California Legislature. His
18 actions were unconstitutional under the United States Constitution, Article II, Section 1,
19 Clause 2.

20 **Count 8:**

21 XX.

22 Defendant Gavin Newsom changed by Executive Order N-67-20 the time and manner
23 of casting individual citizen ballots, the exclusive province of the California Legislature.
24 Since his actions were without statutory authority and illegal, he is personally liable to the
25 citizens of New California and Plaintiff Paul Preston for the damage caused in excess of FIVE
26 HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS (\$500,000,000) or a greater amount to be proven at trial .

27 **Count 9:**

28 XXI.

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AND OTHER RELIEF

1 Defendant Alex Padilla, the then-Secretary of State, did not attest, sign off and approve
2 the Executive Order N-67-20 which changed the time and manner of citizen voting. As a
3 result, his certification of the validity of the votes by individual citizens was in dereliction of
4 his official duties rendering the certification of the votes without lawful basis in excess of
5 FIVE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS (\$500,000,000) or a greater amount to be proven at trial.

6
7 **Count 10:**

8 XXII.

9 Defendant Alex Padilla, the then-Secretary of State, did not attest, sign off and
10 approve the Executive Order N-67-20 which changed the time and manner of citizen voting.
11 As a result, his certification of the validity of the votes by individual citizens was in
12 dereliction of his official duties harming the citizens of New California State and Plaintiff
13 Paul Preston in excess of FIVE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS (\$500,000,000) or a greater
14 amount to be proven at trial.

15 **Count 11:**

16 XXIII.

17 Shirley Weber, upon assuming office as Secretary of State and becoming aware of the
18 defective wording of the Presidential ballots cast by individual voters should have decertified
19 all individually cast ballots. Her failure to decertify the individually-cast ballots harmed the
20 people of the State of New California and Plaintiff Paul Preston in excess of FIVE HUNDRED
21 MILLION DOLLARS (\$500,000,000) or a greater amount to be proven at trial.

22 **Count 12:**

23 XXIV.

24 The actions of Defendants in their official capacities have harmed Plaintiff New
25 California State and Plaintiff Paul Preston in excess of FIVE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS
26 (\$500,000,000) or a greater amount to be proven at trial.

27 **Count 13:**

28 Page 6 of 8 pages: PETITION AND WRIT TO DECLARE THE VOTER BALLOTS CAST IN THE
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1 XXV.

2 The actions of Defendants in their personal capacities have harmed Plaintiff New
3 California State and Plaintiff Paul Preston in excess of FIVE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS
4 (\$500,000,000) or a greater amount to be proven at trial.

5 XXVI.

6 Petitioners requests leave of the Court to add such additional causes of action and
7 grounds for relief as may appear by the time of the closing of any hearing or trial in this
8 matter.

9 PRAYER

10 Petitioners request that this Honorable Court:

- 11 1. Declare the ballots procured pursuant to the unconstitutional Executive
12 Order procurement void for all purposes except as exhibits in this matter;
- 13 2. Affirm the rule of law by declaring that any citizen ballot not containing
14 both paragraphs required by Elections Code §§ 13205(b) and (c) which ballots
15 were filed with Registrars of Voters and/or "voted" by submission to any
16 County Clerk or other repository in the November, 2020 election statewide be
17 null and void, and not be counted for any purpose in the November, 2020
18 election.
- 19 3. Decertify the Presidential vote total of any citizen ballot not containing
20 both paragraphs required by Elections Code §§ 13205(b) and (c) which were
21 filed with any Registrar of Voters and/or "voted" by submission to any
22 County Clerk or other repository in the November, 2020 election.
- 23 4. Decertify the election of any Presidential Elector selected as a result of
24 the casting and/or counting of any statutorily defective ballot not containing
25 both paragraphs required by Elections Code §§ 13205(b) and (c).
- 26 5. Affirm the validity of Elections Code §13200 by declaring that any
27 purported "Presidential Elector" allegedly selected as a result of the use of
28 citizen ballots not containing both paragraphs required by Elections Code §§
13205(b) and (c) which can not "be cast nor counted at any election" and cast
in the November, 2020 election is not, in fact, lawfully selected for any

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purpose;

6. Affirm the United States Constitution, Article II, Section 1, Clause 2, by finding that the departure from the statutory language mandated by the Elections Code, Chapter 3 [§§13200 *et. seq.*] renders the purported 55 California Electoral College Votes null and void for all purposes;
7. That Plaintiffs/Petitioners be awarded damages in the of FIVE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS (\$500,000,000) or a greater amount to be proven at trial;
8. That Plaintiffs/Petitioners be awarded costs and fees incurred in this action; and,
9. For such other relief as the Court may deem appropriate.
